E. ANNUAL AUDIT by N&K CPA's Inc.

The primary purpose was to form an opinion of the Stadium Authority's financial statements for the fiscal year ending 6/30/21. The Stadium Authority received an unmodified opinion by N&K CPA's, Inc. that the financial statements were presented fairly in all material respects, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. IMPAIRMENT SUMMARY

As part of stadium's annual financial audit, it is management's responsibility to present financial statements that provide a fair representation of our financial condition. It is the responsibility of the auditor to express an opinion on the stadium's financial statements with reasonable assurance that management's financial statements are free from material misstatements.

A number of major factors have affected the overall useful life of the stadium structure, including the COVID-19 pandemic and related restrictions imposed on activities to minimize spread of the virus, insufficient funding to maintain and repair the facility, and the planned redevelopment of the site. Due to these major factors, the Stadium Authority Board voted to decommission the facility and subsequently demolish the stadium. These factors and the impact to the useful life of the stadium structure necessitated an assessment on whether the Aloha Stadium facility continues to maintain its existing net value or whether the marked changes warranted an assessment of impairment of the facility.

This assessment of impairment is a two-step process that included identifying potential impairments, and then testing for impairment.

The indicator of impairment in this case was <u>a change in the manner or the expected duration of use of</u> the capital asset.

We then performed the impairment test and used a <u>service utility approach</u> (<u>we evaluated data in the bowl area: number of events, attendance, and bowl revenue</u>) combined with restrictions on large gatherings imposed by the Governor of the State of Hawaii and the Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu.

Based on management's findings, it concluded that these factors are significant and unexpected and the basis for supporting full impairment of the facility.

Given the aforementioned major factors coupled with the stadium no longer being used as originally intended, and with a projected demolition date within two (2) years, the process of demolition is considered permanent destruction of the asset and results in a fair value of zero. Based on the foregoing, Stadium will recognize an impairment loss totaling \$73,324,765.

MONTHLY SECURITY REPORT TO THE BOARD

Brief summary of security related incidents which occurred January 1, 2022, through January 31, 2022.

Motor Vehicle Colision (MVC) Minor

On January 9, 2022, at approximately 6:10 a.m., a Shopper trying to enter Swap Meet hit Cattle Gate and Woodend Barricades at Halawa Parking Gate 3, under H-1 Freeway. Minor damage to wooden barricades and Cattle Gate chain was broken. Minor damage to Shopper's vehicle. Shopper stated they had no injuries and no injuries were observed. Shopper did not realize they had hit wooden barricades or chain. Parking Supervisor Kim DELA CRUZ notified Contract Security Officer and Honolulu Police Department (HPD). HPD Report was filed for MVC- Minor; Stadium Incident Report was completed.

Swap Meet

Stadium Nurses reported six Medical Assistance Calls; all six calls were Injured Cared For (ICF). Three Trip & Fall cases- one individual was evaluated & treated by Stadium Nurse, then refused any further medical treatment. Injured person was released to family member. Second case, individual was evaluated & treated by Stadium Nurse, then released to family member. Third case, individual was evaluated & treated by Stadium Nurse, then declined Nurse's recommendation to call Emergency Medical Services (EMS). Injured person was released to family member, who stated they will follow-up with their personal Doctor following next day. One individual was evaluated & treated by Stadium Nurse, then released to family member, who stated Injured person "looked better" after treatment from Nurse. One individual was evaluated & treated by Stadium Nurse, then requested an ambulance. It was determined this injured person had been released from hospital earlier in morning and had pre-existing injuries. One injured person, a Stadium employee, was evaluated & treated by Stadium Nurse and refused recommended medication. Stadium employee was released to Stadium Supervisor and returned to work.

One Shopper was injured at Main Salt Lake Gate, when walking into Swap Meet. Injured person was cared for by a friend and declined calling Stadium Nurse. Shopper continued to Swap Meet. Stadium Incident Report was completed.

Engineering Branch Report For Stadium Authority Board Meeting February 15, 2022

1. Maintenance & Facility Items

- a. Water/Irrigation Line Leaks:
 - i. Irrigation line repair along southwest service road completed.
 - ii. Water Line repair in parking section 5 completed. This repair allows the Gate 4 restrooms to be re-opened for Swap Meet use.
 - iii. Irrigation line repair in Upper Halawa Lot repaired. Area still needs to have asphalt patched (pictures below)

- c. A 90' lift was rented to replace ballasts and light bulbs in select light poles in Upper & Lower Halawa Parking Lots. Completed on February 10, 2022.

2. General / Other

SUBJECT: City Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) and Housing Infrastructure Priorities

Per your request at the Hawaii Business Roundtable Housing Infrastructure Task Force, the Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) is providing the attached lists of the City's priority infrastructure projects for your ongoing discussions with legislators and county staff about infrastructure funding. The DPP's overall priority is to improve infrastructure capacity in the TOD areas with large State/County ownership of developable land, including Iwilei/Kapalama, Aloha Stadium, Pearl City to Pearl Highlands, and East Kapolei. These priorities align with our work with state partners in the Interagency TOD Council. In addition to the TOD areas, I have also tasked staff with targeting accelerated housing development in underutilized parts of the urbanized area with good transit service just outside of the TOD zones.

The attached lists summarize priority infrastructure projects to support housing and commercial development in the TOD areas along the rail corridor. They include primarily projects that could be accelerated with state or federal funding. Several other TOD infrastructure projects are in planning, design, or construction using City funds (rail access, complete streets, transit centers, sewer and water).

Iwilei/Kapalama Area Projects. The \$81.9 million in Iwilei/Kapalama projects are planning-level cost estimates excerpted from the State Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation(HHFDC) / Department of Accounting and General Services Iwilei Infrastructure Master Plan (underway in partnership with the City), based on prioritization discussions at the State TOD Council. Updated estimates and more detailed project descriptions will be included in the Infrastructure Master Plan (a draft should be available in spring 2022). These initial-phase projects are needed to support currently-planned redevelopment of Mayor Wright Homes and Liliha Civic Center (over

3,000 units), but will also serve future development of over 21,000 units on several other public and private properties in the Iwilei area.

An effective strategy, given pending completion of the infrastructure master plan, might be to allocate funds to an existing funding mechanism like the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund which could be allocated by HHFDC to complete design and delivery of these projects.

Sewer Improvements for TOD Development. The \$482.7 million in Sewer Improvements for TOD Development are sewer collection system projects along the rail corridor planned/budgeted by the City Department of Environmental Services (ENV) for completion with City Capital Improvement Program funds over the next twelve years. Although the Iwilei projects could be accelerated via implementation of the infrastructure master plan, the remaining projects would be phased construction from Waipahu to Halawa. It may be possible to accelerate construction of the initial Waipahu projects with federal funds, either direct or via the State Department of Health revolving fund mechanisms. This could allow city funds to be reallocated to the next project in line, which could reduce the time required to provide capacity to Halawa for the Aloha Stadium development.

Primary Urban Center Development Plan (PUC DP) Growth Focus Areas. In addition to the TOD zones, the draft PUC DP has identified several areas where TOD-type mixed-used development should be encouraged. These tend to be in the urban area mauka of or near the TOD zones, with frequent bus service and walkable to shops and services. Examples include Waikiki, South King/Beretania, Waialae and Kapahulu, McCully/Moillili, Makiki, Liliha-Nuuanu, and Waimano Home/Lehua. DPP staff is working with ENV to assess which of these areas have existing sewer capacity for near-term housing development, and where any improvements are needed.

JCI Honolulu Proposal for "Megabon"

Saturday, July 23, 2022 3:00pm - 9:00pm

Introduction:

JCI Honolulu is a local 501c(4) non-profit leadership development organization whose mission is to "Provide development opportunities that empower young people to create positive change." Formerly, we were known to be "Jaycees." We build leaders, by organizing and delivering projects that the members can be involved in, ranging from smaller social events, to larger community events. In 2019 during the height of the global pandemic, JCI Honolulu members came together to organize a project called Operation Tomodachi, which donated 80,000 masks and 10,000 sanitizer bottles to public schools affiliated with our AERo Program, a STEM based drone racing robotics program. One of our members also organized the Keiki Desk Project, which has donated, to date, 27,000 affordable folding children's desks to students across Hawaii and Washington. Previously, JCI Honolulu has successfully hosted the Noodle Festival, a large community event based around a family favorite, Noodles, from 2017 and 2018 with AT-Marketing and VlohA.

The Honolulu Junior Chamber, a recently organized 501c(3) public charity composed of JCI Honolulu veteran alumni that runs educational programs and future scholarship offerings.

Located in the heart of Nuuanu, Todaiji Hawaii Bekkaku Honzan, is a local Buddhist Temple. The temple was originally an affiliate branch of the main Todaiji Temple located in Nara, Japan, but became its own temple and is considered the main branch in the United States that serves as Todaiji's "Gateway to the West."

Project Scope:

JCI Honolulu, the Honolulu Junior Chamber, and Todaiji Hawaii, look to come together to organize and host the first ever "Megabon," which will be a large community bon dance event. The event will host food vendors specializing in Japanese festival type foods from local restaurants, Japanese festival games for the families, live entertainment, beverage vendors, and a mega sized bon dance.

JCI has issued a global project called JCI RISE, to revitalize our local communities, support local businesses following the hardships faced from the global pandemic. The Megabon will look to revitalize our community following the global COVID19 pandemic with an outstanding one-of-a-kind event bringing all of the wonderful elements of a Japanese festival to Hawaii. Our team will also be working with our sister chapter from Osaka, Japan, to bring authentic games, merchandise, and the true essence of the bon dance to Hawaii.

The Hawaiian Humane Society will be engaging in a large scale project in April and again in the fall, in partnership with Greater Good Charities, to spay/neuter a total of 1800 cats over the course of a 6 day clinic, to help reduce overpopulation on Oahu. These types of large spay/neuter clinics are a proven method to reduce cat overpopulation within communities and are well-planned and executed events. Greater Good Charities has just completed two projects of this nature on Kauai with Kauai Humane Society, and we are excited to be able to multiply these efforts here on Oahu.

One of our needs to be able to coordinate this event is to have access to a space large enough to accommodate the clinic. We are seeking a 4-5K square foot location that could be appropriately secured, cleaned and with access to power, restrooms and ample parking. The Aloha Stadium came to mind as a potentially perfect venue.
